County to offer mail-in program, drop-off sites for medical syringes

To prevent dangerous needle sticks, Yolo County has bagged a nearly \$200,000 state grant that will keep sharps out of landfills.

More than 355 million hypodermic needles are dumped in California's landfills each year by people treating diabetes, arthritis, migraines, infertility and blood disorders, according to a news release.

Trashed needles can endanger sanitation workers, children and the general public, the news release said.


With the money, the county will provide free drop-off

and mail-back containers so users can get rid of needles safely. The containers will be available in mid-May, said Marissa Juhler of Yolo County Integrated Waste Management.

Drop-off sites will include the county's central landfill, the Davis Senior Center and area pharmacies. A full list of sites will be available in the coming weeks, Juhler said.

The \$197,680 grant comes from the California Integrated Waste Management Board after state legislation, SB 1305, went into effect in September, making it illegal to throw needles in the trash.
